
It is also a significant time for year 8 and 10

# Recognising Achievements

## Kate Gibson - Rotary Public Speaking

Kate recently participated in the Belrose Rotary Public Speaking competition and this was the speech she gave.

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Having dogs in schools, may to some seem dangerous or distracting, but to me and to my school, we see different. We have a labradoodle called Scout at Davidson, he came to our school last year, and has had a huge impact on our school.

Research shows that having therapy dogs in schools has helped reduce student stress, anxiety and improved school attendance, less wagging of school. Therapy dogs can be used to help find comfort in coming to school and help student well-being.

So what are therapy dogs? A therapy dog is not a service dog, but a dog that reacts and responds to people, under the direction of their owner. Therapy dogs can be used as animal assisted therapy, which aims to improve someone's social cognitive and emotional well-being. They are used in schools, aged care homes, hospitals and private homes.

More and more students are starting school anxious, sad or depressed, and without a solution to this, it will only get worse. Research shows that using therapy dogs in response to a traumatic event can help reduce symptoms of anxiety, depression and post traumatic stress disorder.

There are many benefits to having therapy dogs in schools, one being an increase of school attendance. This is so because when students know that they have a calm and welcoming dog at school, school will be a much better place for them than it was without the dogs.

Another benefit of having therapy dogs in schools is that it decreases levels of anxiety in young students, resulting in increases in reading and writing skills.

Despite these many benefits many schools choose not to have therapy dogs, because they believe that there are many risks, such as allergy issues and more. But my school has a dog. And we do not have these concerns.

At the beginning of 2017, which was my first year of high school, our school had just started a program with a dog named Scout, a labradoodle. One of the main concerns of having a dog in schools was allergies, but Scout is an allergy free dog.

Scout came to our school when he was very young, and could be held in someone's arms! But now he has grown up, and grown up with our school. Scout has been involved in training programs, that students including myself have had the privilege of joining in on.

Scout has helped our school in many ways, such as helping out in PE lessons, and helping out in learning support, as well as comforting students who need help. He has had a huge impact on our school and it wouldn't be the same without him.

Scout has been a great help to our school, and schools everywhere should have this privilege of having a therapy dog in school, whatever the risks, having a stable and relaxed student body, is so worth it.

# Science

## Year 11 Biology and Earth and Environmental Science Excursion—Bobbin Head



On the 24th of May, the team at Gibberagong Environmental Education Centre guided both Year 11 Biology and Earth and Environmental Science classes around the Bobbin Head area to research our depth studies.

In the protected mangrove forests of Bobbin Head, Biology students got a chance to observe first-hand a complex and vital ecosystem and how it has been affected by human activity.

The opportunity to interact with unique species of plants and animals will be a major part of our depth study projects; the information we collected will form the basis of our research.

The Earth and Environmental Science class branched off during the excursion to research their field of interest. The endangered southern brown bandicoot species at Bobbin Head presents a unique opportunity for students to assess abiotic and biotic factors in animal habitats, and how fox populations have impacted on this species. For both classes, analysing these sites allowed for students to directly see what they were studying and connect with the concepts they have been taught.





Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on school students with disability - 2018

Our school is participating in the National Collection of Data this year. This means that we collect data on students who require Learning Support or who have a disability. The process is the same as last year.

Information will be collected about the support that is being provided to students within the school. Better data will help the Government plan for student learning.

Please note, the data collection will have no direct impact on your child and they will **not** be involved in any testing process. The NSW Department of Education and Communities will provide data to the Australian Government from all NSW public schools in such a way that no individual student or school will be able to be identified. In this way, privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured.

All information is protected by privacy laws which regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. 
