## The Secretary of the Department Of Education Visits Davidson

Recently Mark Scott, the highest ranking person in education, visited our school.

Mark Scott has had an interesting career beginning as a classroom teacher and then moving on to working in the print media as a journalist including Education Editor of The Sydney Morning Herald and Editor-in-Chief of metropolitan, regional and community newspapers.

From 2006 to 2016, Mark was Managing Director of the ABC and led the organisation's transformation to be a public broadcaster in the digital era. Over that time, the ABC created new services like iview, News 24, ABC3 and digital radio; and expanded online and mobile services, such as podcasting and ABC News online. Mark was appointed as the Secretary of Education in 2016 and has proceeded to make significant changes in how the Department of Education operates. The NSW department is the largest education system in Australia, operating 2,200 public schools for almost 800,000 students. Mark has a core belief in providing the best education possible for students in NSW and that students are known, valued and cared for in our schools.

His visit provided students with the opportunity to quiz him about the future of education and testing in our schools. The students peppered him with interesting questions about the future of NAPLAN, the possibility of moving the HSC online, jobs in the future, how education might change in their generation, the challenges of his job and the inevitable question about school uniform.

After the Q and A with students he met with our early career teachers and our Instructional Leaders. He showed a great interest in the program that has been developed at Davidson to support new teachers and had many questions for them about their Davidson experience.

After that conversation he visited a literacy session with Ms Coletta and Yr 8 and then met with the leaders of the Literacy Initiative to discuss the progress of the project. Finally he met with the School Captains and Vice Captains to discuss their future plans and their interest in the different university courses on offer.

It was a privilege to have Mark Scott here at Davidson. It gave him an opportunity to unpack his vision for education and for us to showcase for him some of the great things that go on at Davidson.

"So everyone's going to need strong literacy and numeracy standards to be able to keep learning during their life. They're going to need deep knowledge, they're going to need general capabilities like creative thinking and collaboration, and they're going to need a growth mindset." Mark Scott

All of these things are part of what we are currently delivering at Davidson through the Davidson Circle of Practice. We're on track and on target.


#### **Science Classes**

The money was donated to help rebuild a school that assisted students who have learning difficulties.




