The NSW Waterpolo State Club Championships were held in the April school holidays. 14 teams from across NSW and ACT competed, coming from as far away as Tamworth and Ovens and Murray in the Southern NSW region.

Ryan Hunter competed with his club team SNB (Sydney Northern Beaches) Breakers. They lost one game in their pool before coming up against UNSW Wests for a chance to play for a medal. The team had a brilliant game, defeating Wests for the first time. This put them in the position to play for a medal where they outplayed Hunter from the start and easily defeated them to get a bronze medal.

Ryan was also awarded the NSW MVG (Most Valuable Goalie) and was also one of the "7s", one of the top 7 players of the tournament.

Maths

PROBLEM-SOLVING IN YEAR 7

Problem-solving is an important aspect in the learning of mathematics. While students who memorise formulas and a set of steps can only solve problems that they have already encountered, students who are problem-solvers can be flexible in their approach. They can draw upon a diversity of strategies to solve the problem at hand.

The benefits to fostering problem-solving skills include:

- Enhancing understanding of mathematical concepts
- Extending creativity and a willingness to experiment
- Building confidence and perseverance
- Developing logical thinking

This year, we have endeavoured to provide many opportunities for problem-solving in Year 7 Maths.

Problem of the Week


Every Monday, a Problem of the Week is posted on Google Classroom linked to our current topic, allowing students to put their skills into practice in unfamiliar situations.

Have a go at this problem for Week 3:

Problem of the Week Problem C Colour by Numbers

Jessica is going to colour the hexagons in the tiling below. Each hexagon will be coloured with a single colour. If two hexagons share a side, then they will be coloured with a different colour.

What is the fewest number of colours that Jessica can use to colour all the hexagons?



While this problem is not too complex, the more challenging aspect is being able to explain their solution. These conversations on strategy sharing emphasise the importance of being able to use multiple strategies to solve a problem.

We can then link problems to harder concepts. Did you know that any map can be coloured in with only four colours and no adjacent regions will be the same colour? Mathematicians were only able to prove this theorem in 1976, showing how hard it can be to prove seemingly obvious concepts!

Year 7 Mathematics Website

For students (or parents!) who are looking to extend their understanding and apply what they learn in class, we encourage them to visit and try a problem from the DHS Year 7 Mathematics Website (https://sites.google.com/education.nsw.gov.au/dhs-year-7-mathematics/home). This website is accessible by all and has a range of fun and interesting maths problems that are organised by topics.

Games and Puzzles

So, what can you do at home to help? Games and puzzles are an excellent way to develop problem solving skills and there's an amazing range of games available. Here, our 7E students are playing Mabble (think Scrabble with equations).



HSC Dance

The Core Performance worth 20% is a technical sequence of movements that requires students to work individually within their capabilities and limitations to demonstrate a practical understanding of their knowledge and class work. This includes Dance Technique, Safe Dance Practice and Performance Quality.

For Core Composition worth 20% students are required to follow a compositional process to create a work that


communicates a specific concept/intent. They must then teach their work to a younger student from Davidson HS to perform.

For the Major Study worth 40% students choose an area of interest to develop their skills further. This includes Dance Technique, Safe Dance Practice and Performance Quality in relation to an interpretation.
