Principal's Report

It is quite amazing to think we are at the end of Term 2 and half way through the year. Having said that, it has been a massive term for students and staff.

A big congratulations to all concerned with SOPA. Unless you are involved it is hard to really understand what is required and the hours students and staff spend rehearsing, planning and actually running 6 performances in two days. Ms Smirniotis and the CAPA staff have shown wonderful leadership and commitment to the event and been incredibly inclusive in bringing together over 300 students to produce a very polished show.

Best of luck to Year 12 who will be sitting their Trial HSC exams in weeks 1 and 2 of Term 3. These exams provide students with the opportunity to effectively experience an HSC paper in terms of duration and questions. All Year 12 have their trial exam timetables so they have plenty of time to plan a study routine and I would encourage them to attempt past HSC papers and seek as much feedback and advice from their teachers as possible.

It is also a significant and exciting time for Year 8 and 10 students who begin the process of choosing subjects for 2023. Students of both year groups have been provided with a range of information to help them make positive and informed choices in terms of the subjects they wish to do next year as well as the levels of English and Maths students can choose for their Preliminary HSC course. A reminder that these are due back to the school in week 1 of Term 3.

I would like to thank all the students who have been involved in a uniform review for the school over the past 6 months. I feel very proud to work with such thoughtful, respectful and positive young people. They have provided advice, feedback and designs for some adjustments to the school uniform. These have been shared with our P&C and I will be able to provide more information on our return to school next term.

A quick update on the mobile phone pouches. After almost 8 weeks in use I have seem some significant changes. Students are being more active in their breaks with



plenty of handball and basketball taking place. In the library I am witnessing card games, board games and also groups of students sitting in circles talking to each other. Classrooms have effectively become phone free and this has allowed staff to focus on educating students. Finally, in 8 weeks of the policy there has been a 90% reduction in behavioural issues related to phones in the school. We will continue to pursue the policy and provide opportunities for students to communicate and engage without the need for phones. The majority of students have adapted to the process really well and I congratulate them for that.

Finally, I feel it is important to recognise the challenges families and the school continue to face with what feels like a second round of Covid as well as what is turning out to be a difficult flu season. Thank you to families for their communication and a congratulations to all students who find a way to stay on top of their classwork and assignments while at home. We have some very resilient and committed students at our school. It does seem we will continue to face these issues moving into Term 3.

I trust everyone will have a healthy and enjoyable holiday and I look forward to seeing all students return in Term 3.

Testing will continue to be administered electronically and from 2023, NAPLAN will be held in Term 1.

HSC trial examinations will take place during the first two weeks of next term. Papers will be sat in a variety of spaces around the school and all students are reminded to support our senior students by limiting noise and other distractions. Good luck Year 12.

Years 8 and 9 have been able to experience whole cohort excursions through their studies in Science. Year traveling to Taronga Zoo to research endangered species and Year 8 visiting Luna Park to further investigate their unit of work on Energy.


Australian Mountain Bike Interschools 2022


Conor Clarke and Aiden Patterson





This involves a theory paper, a run-swim-run, a rescue scenario and resuscitation. The four components are all given separate scores and the scores added together to determine the winning team. Their first year in the competition and her team won the bronze medal.

She then flew to Wagga as she was selected in the Sydney Metro Academy of Sport 18/U girls hockey team for the NSW Academy Games. The team went through the rounds and semi undefeated, with no goals scored against them. The Grand Final was 0-0 at full time and went to a penalty shoot-out. Kirra defended her goals and didn't let one ball in - the team eventually winning 5-0, remaining undefeated the entire tournament and not one goal scored against her.

Kirra also had a great U/18 State Championships in Armidale, where the Sydney North and Beaches/2 team won their Division. With her performance at the Academy Games and the State Championships Kirra was rewarded with selection in the Hockey NSW 18/U Accelerated Athlete Program for 2022-23.

Positive Education Update

After a few chaotic years of COVD interruptions, the Davidson High School community is once again focusing on Positive Education and embedding this philosophy into all areas of school life.

Positive Education draws from the concept of Positive Psychology, an umbrella term for applied research that aims to discover and promote the factors that allow individuals and communities to thrive or flourish. It builds from the work of psychologist, Dr Martin Seligman. It seeks to equip individuals, teams and organisations with evidence-based strategies to improve wellbeing and performance. You could say it is the science of optimal functioning.

Positive Psychology adopts a strengths-based approach to wellbeing and performance. It aims to develop interventions that build on people's strengths, rather than remediate their weaknesses. Positive Psychology begins not by asking what is wrong, but what is right, what is working well, and then builds on that.

Geelong Grammar first coined the term 'Positive Education' whilst working closely with Dr Seligman in establishing a framework for improving the wellbeing of their students. We seek to take our own individualised approach to this practice as we move forward. Our aim is to embed the ideas of Positive Education into all areas of our lives here at Davidson. To begin with we have started a Positive Education team whose goal is to improve some of our practices and processes and align them with this new philosophy. This has already been seen through our work with students on their individual character strengths, the new school logo and key words and our updated school merit system.

Over the coming terms we will also be refining our school discipline policy, the language used in classroom instruction, assessment tasks and reports as well as more explicitly teaching the concepts of Positive Education directly to students.

More than just a flag

Last term, we were pleased to see a new addition to the entrance to our school - a new flagpole to allow us to proudly fly the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags, in addition to our existing flagpole flying the Australian National flag. Every day one of students raises the flags in the morning and lowers the flags at the end of the school day.

Our new flags help us show respect for, and recognition of, First Nations peoples and promote a sense of community partnership in a commitment towards reconciliation. They help remind us to reflect upon this year's National Reconciliation Week theme of Be Brave, Make Change. By using this time to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements, we can explore how each of us can contribute to the ongoing journey of achieving reconciliation in Australia.

The two flags are more much than just a flag, being rich in symbolism and both highlighting the strong connections between Australia's Indigenous peoples and the country in which we all live.

The Aboriginal flag, designed and created by artist Harold Thomas, a Luritja man from central Australia and a member of the Stolen Generations, has become an enduring symbol of Aboriginal strength, representing





Aboriginal people and their ongoing spiritual connection to the land. The black top half of the flag symbolises Aboriginal people, the red lower half stands for the earth and the colour of ochre, which has ceremonial significance, whilst the circle represents the sun.

The Torres Strait Islander flag was designed by the late Bernard Namok and the colours of the flag represent the Torres Strait Islander people's connection to the land, sea and sky. The green panels represent the land, the blue panel the sea and the black lines dividing the panels represent the Torres Strait Islander people. In the centre of the flag is a white dhari, a dancer's headdress representing Torres Strait Islander culture. Underneath the dhari is a white five-pointed star which is both an important symbol for navigating the sea and represents the five island groups in the Torres Strait and the white symbolises peace.

We all have a role to play when it comes to reconciliation, and our flags are just a small step we are taking towards helping collectively build relationships and communities that value Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, histories, cultures, and futures.

Year 8 have been making paper helicopters and investigating energy transformation.































Biology - Year 11

Excursion to Narrabeen Rock Pool and Coastal Education CentreBy Maddy Rose

On Friday 13 May, Year 11 Biology classes went on an excursion to Narrabeen Rock Platform.

The goal of the excursion was to learn more about coastal environments and organisms, develop our sampling techniques, and collect data for our depth study assignment.

Following a very helpful and fascinating presentation from two presenters at the Coastal Education Centre, we headed out onto the rock platform. It was rainy and cold, but in spite of that we managed to both collect data and enjoy ourselves. Our data collection involved using two sampling techniques, transects and quadrats, which we had previously learnt about in class, but now got to put into practice.

Quadrats are basically just little squares used to estimate abundance and diversity, and a transect is a long line which is sampled along to get a view of different areas of one environment. Lots of information which will be used for our depth studies was collected, including salinity, temperature and species abundance. Beyond that, a highlight of the excursion was definitely the spotting of a Gloomy Octopus. It was quite a marvel, but it did become understandably gloomy after all the attention and hid away under a rock with its impressive camouflage skills.

Overall, the excursion was informative and worthwhile, and many thanks go to Mrs Mendham and Ms Rabiei for organising it.









Biology - Year 11

We were involved in the environmentally sustainable practices of composting food waste through worm farms,

and were taught about the use of the by-product as an organic soil fertiliser. What was most surprising is that we stood on gravel made up of reused materials which may have once been the roof of someone's house.

The excursion to Kimbriki Resource Recovery Centre provided us with a lot of useful knowledge on how to use sustainable strategies in our own lives and the facilities available Kimbriki tip.

Library

In Thinking Skills this term, we have been focused on research skills. This unit of work has helped support students with their history research task and beyond. Students have learnt about search strategies, locating a variety of resources, evaluating resources, plagiarism and paraphrasing. Students are encouraged to utilise the Oliver Library System to find resources in Davidson library, on Britannica Schools Online, ClickView and in the Northern Beaches Libraries.

Year 8



Three winners from each category were selected, plus a People's Choice Award which was voted for by staff, students and the community.







From your app, go into Settings cog in the top left corner of the dashboard screen, then into App Version. (See image below.)




I am on Version 3 or 4
